

Facts and Figures

Interface – The knowledge connection for business, was established in August 2005, as a central point of access to help companies utilise the world-class technology, skills and research available within Scotland's universities. In 2007, Interface expanded its remit to include Scotland's research institutes, now representing 24 higher education and research institutions. In 2008, Interface was awarded a further five years funding from The Scottish Funding Council, following the success of its three year pilot phase.

Now in its seventh year of the project, Interface has introduced over 900 businesses to academic partners and its success story is reflected in the following:

- Over 3254 enquiries received
- 1557 enquiries have progressed beyond enquiry stage to establishing capability and capacity
- 473 company and university collaborative projects initiated
- Over 222 companies in discussions or at stage of negotiation with universities
- 74% of companies who have initiated projects have not previously worked with that academic partner
- 66% of enquiries are from Scottish SME's
- 13% of enquiries are from the rest of the UK & International organisations

Building links and developing its operational procedures

Interface has established operational mechanisms, which includes a database of university capabilities and a network of contacts within each partner institution – this helps simplify and speed up the match-making process.

Interface has also developed links with business advisors and trade associations such as Scottish Enterprise, Highlands and Islands Enterprise, CBI, IoD, Chambers of Commerce, Scottish Engineering, Scotland IS, etc. Over 50% of Interface enquiries are referred from these organisations, which clearly demonstrates their support and promotion of the Interface service. Interface also receives referrals from academic partners, as a result of the close relationships developed.

The NEW Interface website has recently been launched and provides a comprehensive guide to funding opportunities to support company engagement with academia, case studies and relevant networking events.

Collaborative projects already underway facilitated by Interface

Research Collaboration: Annandale Distillery was introduced to experts in the University of Glasgow, University of Dundee and Glasgow Caledonian University to help get a new brand of whisky out of the distillery and into the marketplace. *"I am so grateful Interface brought together this range of extraordinary academic talent. Knowledge Transfer Partnership: Nairn's Oatcakes Ltd is working with the Scottish Crop Research Institute and awarded a KTP to investigate how to reduce saturated fat levels and the causes of rancidity in their oatcakes. *"Interface introduced us to a number of institutions before we opted to work with the SCRI and apply for a KTP which combined various areas of interest into one project. Access to facilities: Thales is collaborating with Edinburgh Napier University to undertake testing of laser modules and materials analysis.

Industrial Placement: Design LED Products, wanted to showcase their products more effectively. Design students from Glasgow School of Art and Glasgow Caledonian University were placed to showcase its technology in graphic renders and investigate design applications for the technology into other new markets.

Scottish Funding Council Innovation Voucher Scheme

Scottish SME's can access between £500 - £5000 to help offset the costs of collaborate projects between small to medium sized enterprises and Higher Education Institutes in Scotland.

Interface introduced Total Waste Management Alliance Ltd (TWMA) to University West of Scotland and were awarded an innovation voucher to help offset the costs of the collaborative project. The University of the West of Scotland's Environmental Initiatives Research Group is helping TWMA to explore the recycling of waste material generated by offshore oil and gas production. UWS and TWMA are exploring options for reuse of materials, in particular rock flour and oil wastes, which are currently disposed of through conventional routes (land fill of rock and reprocessing of oils). The ultimate aim is to evaluate alternative routes for reuse of wastes and reduce the need for conventional disposal.
